

The flight training is helping him master the fundamentals of airmanship, navigation and communication. "I love working with my instructors," Alder said. "Not only are they good teachers but they have a lot of flying experience."

One of those professors is Jessup's Basic Aircraft Systems instructor Anthony Pollizzi who said, "I'm very passionate about aviation and ensuring WJU builds safe, knowledgeable, professional pilots. A good understanding of the various systems on an aircraft is an important part of that goal." Jessup's aviation program equips students with a solid foundation by integrating biblical principles into their coursework.

Alder enjoys learning about various systems and plans when it comes to air traffic safety in addition to working toward mastering all the necessary preparations before take-off including emergency protocols and using the radio correctly.

Alder also serves as a reservist in the United States
Coast Guard. He has spent summers completing Coast
Guard basic training and completed a 10-week course
to become a Maritime Enforcement Specialist. In this
role he protects America's ports, waterways, and
interests at home and abroad. Alder is enjoying his
six-year stint with the Coast Guard explaining, "I could
see myself staying in the reserves full-time, there is a lot
of comradery that makes it seem family oriented."

Upon graduation Alder hopes to find work for commercial airlines or perhaps fly for FedEx. Either way, Jessup is preparing him for a successful career in the sky.



KEEPING CAMPUS SAFE 24/7

We are familiar with the old sentiment "safety first," but when it comes to campus security, those words speak truth. As Director of Campus Safety, Paul Ybarra is laser-focused on securing Jessup's 128-acre campus 24/7. "Awareness is key," Ybarra said. "One of the most basic things to ensure your safety is to hone in on your surroundings." That might be tougher than most people realize especially because we live in an era when students walk around campus looking down at their phones with their earbuds in place - basically disconnecting two of their major senses. "I tell students, 'if you have to check your phone while you are walking, at least hold it up to eye level so your prereferral vision can help you be better aware of what's happening around you."

Overseeing Campus Safety for the past five years,
Ybarra and his security team monitor those coming
and going from the bustling Rocklin campus. "If
necessary, we have the capability to lock down
campus immediately," Ybarra shared. Campus safety
also provides students with escorts to their cars or

other locations around campus if they don't feel comfortable walking alone.

Scenario-based training is also provided for Jessup's resident assistants at the beginning of each academic year. "We share tips to help our RAs learn what they should be looking for within their living environments," Ybarra said. He also serves as a member of the student care team and speaks at various campus events and orientations to inform the Jessup community of what it takes to be safe.

A familiar and friendly face on campus, Ybarra can usually be found building relationships and making the rounds across campus, checking in to ensure circumstances are in order. Prior to his career at Jessup, Ybarra worked in public safety at University of California, Santa Cruz for nine years. He was recently accepted to Jessup's Masters of Leadership program where he will pursue a concentration in executive leadership.

SPARKING INSPIRATION ABROAD AND TO THE **HEART OF TECH**

Coming to Jessup as a transfer student, alum Karli Wessale had the specific goal of studying abroad from day one. "I always knew Study Abroad was something I was going to pursue (no matter where I went to college) so, the idea that Jessup had a program sealed the deal for me." Getting selected to the Scholars' Semester at Oxford fall semester of her senior year required the English major to spend most of her time studying to maintain her 4.0 average. She also received ministry as well as academic scholarships as a result of her hard work. "The scholarships helped position me for success in continuing my focus on academics at a private university," she said.

The semester at Oxford had Wessale immersed in tutorials, lectures and seminars equivalent to upper-division courses where students engage in a vibrant research culture performing advanced-level work. Living in an area rich in architecture ranging from Gothic spires to Baroque porticoes where nearly every street or building has a tie to a great thinker, theologian or artist did not disappoint. The semester proved to be just as amazing as she had always dreamed. "It really was one of the favorite times in my life because it was such an enriching experience," Wessale remembered. Later that academic year, Wessale went on to graduate from Jessup but it wasn't long before she found herself overseas again. This time, she headed to the University of Edinburgh where she earned her master's degree in Modern Literature.

Wessale described her English courses at Jessup as "high caliber" and recalled that, "Jessup was the place I learned to do my best work. I felt confident because I was able to experiment and be creative and I got out of my comfort zone which helped expand my thinking."

After returning from graduate school in the UK, the Rocklin native landed a tech job inspiring 400 million monthly users the inspiration to create a life they love while working at Pinterest. Wessale secured a position in Pinterest's "people team" (otherwise known as human resources) as a people experience coordinator. In this position, she develops processes to ensure employees are supported and fosters employee growth within the burgeoning company. "I'm very supportive of the culture at Pinterest because it matches who I am. I love being part of a team that creates a culture supporting people to be the best they can be," she added.

While at Jessup, Wessale noted her professors had a big impact on her time as a student and continues to be in touch with some of them to this day. Her writing courses taught her the value of writing to target audiences, a skill she uses daily in her current role. "Jessup's English department had an incredibly positive impact on my studies and shaped my ability to be successful at Oxford and postgraduation," she said.



PARTNERING TO IMPROVE HIGHER EDUCATION FOR **FOSTER YOUTH**

When it comes to former foster youth, very few experience academic success. According to the National Foster Youth Initiative, only half of youth raised in foster care finish high school and less than three percent graduate from a four year college. This fall, WJU and a nonprofit called The Alliance: Defending the Cause are partnering to deliver a new program aimed at changing that statistic. The new College Success Program provides mentoring, resources, and a full-ride scholarship to qualified former foster youth.

For the past three years, Jessup has sought to develop innovative ways to obliterate barriers standing in the way of success for former foster youth. Jessup's welcoming atmosphere, invested teaching staff, and spiritually rich community make it an ideal environment to see these students succeed academically.

Earlier this year, Jessup began conversations with Tiffany Loeffler, founder of The Alliance, which is a nonprofit network of agencies, other nonprofits, community members, businesses and churches working together to protect kids and strengthen families.

Since childhood, Loeffler was encouraged to dream big, explore new things, and embrace her God-given talents. Her parents were devoted to helping her develop strong morals, healthy relationships, and a secure identity. Over the years, she had many other loving adults that poured into her life including coaches, Bible study leaders, and teachers. "There

was never a time where I didn't feel fully loved, supported and encouraged to reach my highest potential," Loeffler said.

Loeffler went on to earn an undergraduate degree followed by a doctorate in physical therapy. As a young adult, she sensed a deep call to "bind up the brokenhearted and defend the cause of the fatherless." She was also motivated by the struggles she witnessed amongst peers who were suffering due to childhood trauma, divorced or dysfunctional parents, or those with no home to return to on school holidays.

Additionally, she and her husband, Matt felt adoption was 'God's Plan A' for them and after a mission trip to Haiti in 2010, they fell in love with the country and began the international adoption process. "Every child deserves to grow up in a safe, loving family and everyone can do something to make that a reality," Loeffler said.

In 2012, Loeffler started serving at-risk youth and families in the Greater Sacramento Area. She and Matt launched a foster care and adoption ministry at their church and later began equipping other churches to do the same. In 2016, Loeffler founded The Alliance: Defending the Cause.

With the help of generous donors and a team of dedicated people, Loeffler is looking forward to seeing former foster youth not only graduate from Jessup, but thrive on campus and in the workplace to the glory of God.
